Dear Friends,

Your support helped us make 2018 a year to celebrate! We continue to be inspired by your dedication of time, effort, and resources. Our team could not do what we do without you, and we give you our deep and sincere gratitude. Thank you.

This was our twentieth year of providing inclusive empowerment through marine science and community sailing. Over the last two decades you have helped us create something unique and powerful – a truly accessible community for everyone to enjoy Boston Harbor and its islands and to learn about our relationship with the ocean.

Boston Harbor belongs to all of us, and it is our responsibility to ensure that access to the harbor is fair and equitable. This year we engaged 2,673 children and adults in our programs through sailing, kayaking, and classroom education. We extended the length of our Harbor Explorers, Future Leaders, and Sailing After School programs giving youth a more in-depth, mentorship-focused, meaningful experience. All of our programming remains 100% accessible to people of all levels of physical and cognitive ability.

Our partnerships grew too – we kicked off new youth programs with Boston Public Schools, the Salesian Boys and Girls Club, Harborkeepers, and Save the Harbor / Save the Bay. We introduced new adaptive partnerships with Triangle, Inc. and the cities of Framingham and Burlington, and grew our partnership with the Bedford VA Hospital for Disabled Veterans' Sailing.

Our East Boston High School Sailing team remains the most diverse in the Massachusetts Bay League. Of all of our program participants across youth, adult, and adaptive programs more than 61% were people of color. More than one third of total participants identified a disability during enrollment and among our youth program participants, some 79% are from families below Boston's Area Median Income and qualify for financial aid. The average youth program student paid a maximum of \$25 to participate in PPSC's programs.

Sailing is a lifelong skill that brings with it a sense of autonomy, self-confidence, empathy, and bravery. By making it an activity accessible to all, you help us conquer the barriers to an equitable harbor, and you provide a life changing experience to hundreds of youth and disabled sailors. Thank you.

SEPTEMBER - JUNE

Climate NATURE

Climate NATURE (Nature as teacher for urban resiliency education) is an in-school program for East Boston 2nd, 4th, and 5th graders. PPSC provides this program in partnership with The Harborkeepers and Eastie Farm. Students engage in hands on climate resiliency projects and learn from stakeholders across the City and the Commonwealth about climate and weather.

DECEMBER - APRIL

Skipjack Mast Restoration

PPSC's High School and Future Leader students work under the supervision of Capt. David Puett to restore a 50' Chesapeake Skipjack mast. A tree felled from Marsh-Billings-Rockefeller National Historical Park through their managed forestry program was shipped to PPSC and is being hand planed and sanded to size. Students learn craftsmanship in this wooden-boat restoration project.

JANUARY - MARCH

Ocean Science After School

Ocean Science After School (OSAS), provides a much needed science-based after school program for East Boston youth in the 4th and 5th grade. The program takes place at the Adams Elementary School during the winter months when the boats are out of the water. Students learn about the effects of climate change on their own neighborhoods, marine life, weather patterns, and local maritime history. The primary activities for OSAS include field trips to local water-access at PPSC's floating classroom. Crab traps remain set on PPSC's dock through the winter for students to pull up and examine. Students also use an underwater remote-operated submarine to explore the harbor floor. In the classroom, participants learn about weather patterns and navigation of their harbor by building their own simple machines to measure wind, buoyancy, and water quality that they can then use outside.

MARCH - JUNE

East Boston High School Varsity Sailing

The most diverse team in the Massachusetts Bay League, and one of only two Boston Public Schools with a high school sailing team, Piers Park hosts and instructs the EBHS varsity sail team. Part of Mass Bay League's B South division, EBHS competes against Brookline, Boston Latin School, Hingham, Nantasket, Notre Dame Academy, and Scituate.

MAY - NOVEMBER

Adaptive Sailing

Through PPSC's inclusive youth and adult programming, and through partnerships with the Bedford VA Hospital, Charlestown Waterfront Coalition, Lesley Threshold Program, Framingham Disabilities Commission, Triangle Inc, East Boston Neighborhood Health Center, PATH-WAY, Inspire Lab, and Burlington Parks & Recreation, PPSC got 526 disabled sailors on the water in 2018. Adaptive sailing continues to grow each year, as does PPSC's equipment to serve sailors of all levels of ability.

MAY - NOVEMBER

Inclusive Youth Development Program (IYDP)

Our IYDP includes Sailing After School for youth age 10-18, Harbor Explorers for youth age 6-9, Science of Sailing for youth age 10-22, and Future Leaders for youth age 14-16.

In total, we serve more than 1,000 youth through the IYDP, and all of our staff came up through these programs. While the Inclusive Youth Development Program has changed a lot since its inception in 1998, the core values remain the same: inclusion, empowerment, mentorship, and equal access.

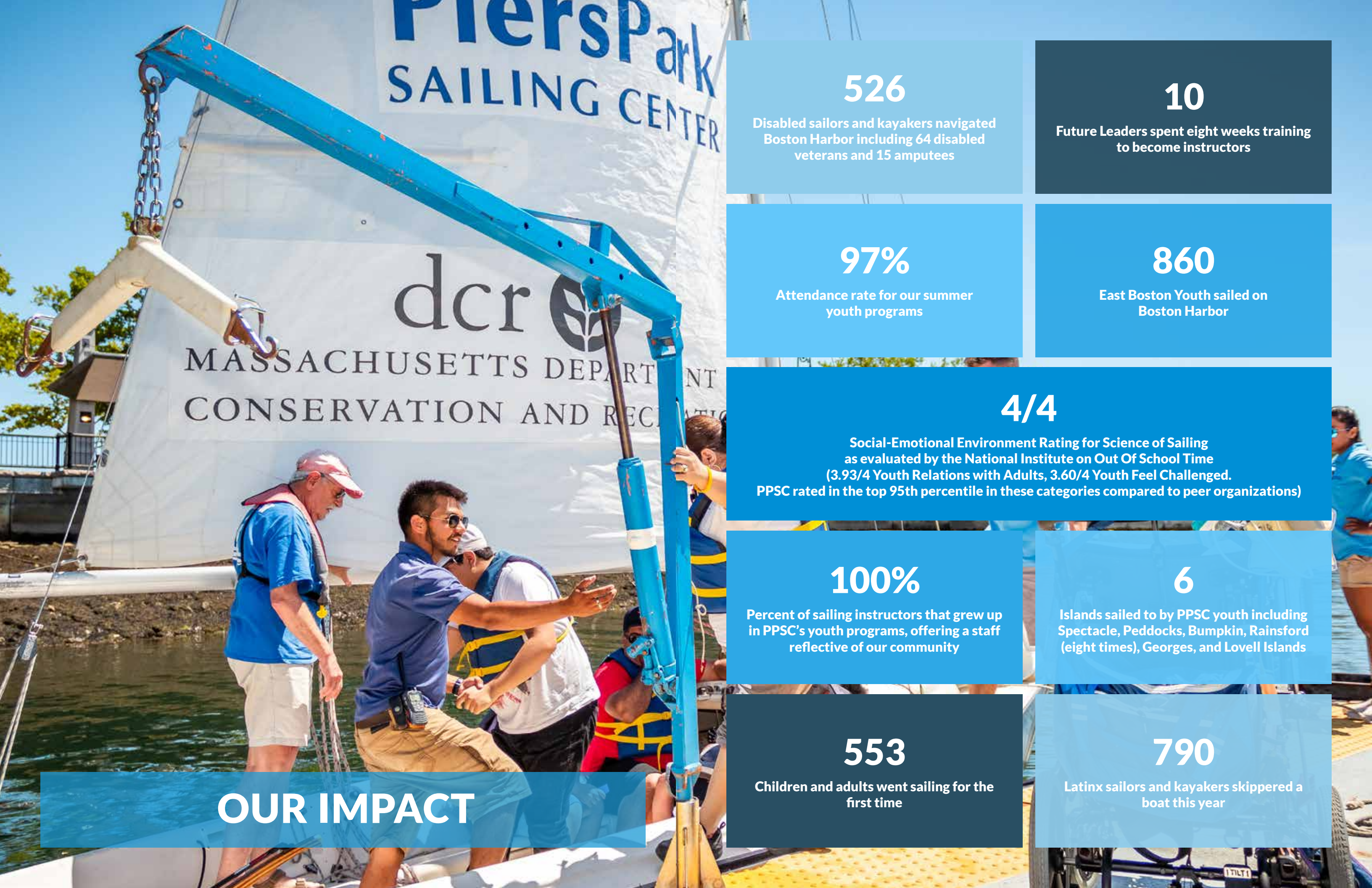
MAY - OCTOBER

Community Sailing & Kayaking

We added free kayaking this year with the support of Save the Harbor/Save the Bay, providing 520 people in East Boston and South Boston with the chance to get out on the harbor. We also took 980 people sailing for free during community events like our opening day, Eastie Week, and Eastie Pride Day. We also certified 41 adults in US Sailing Basic Keelboat and provided free community racing on Thursday nights in the summer.

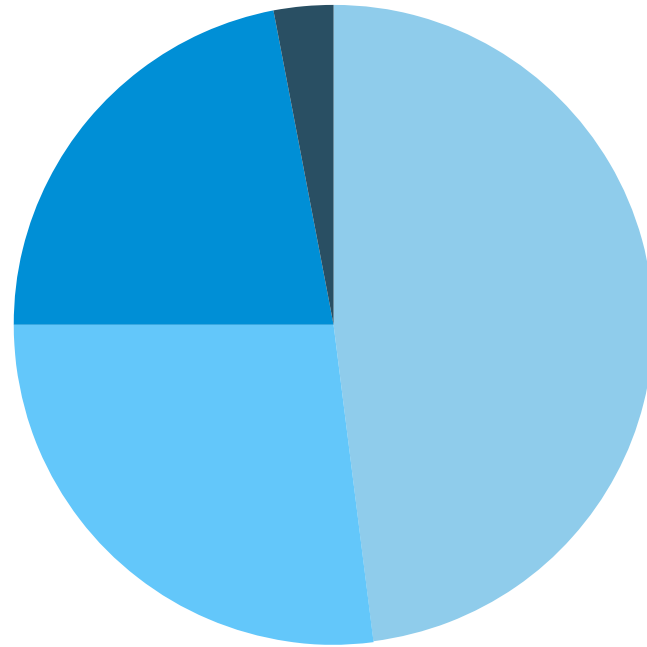

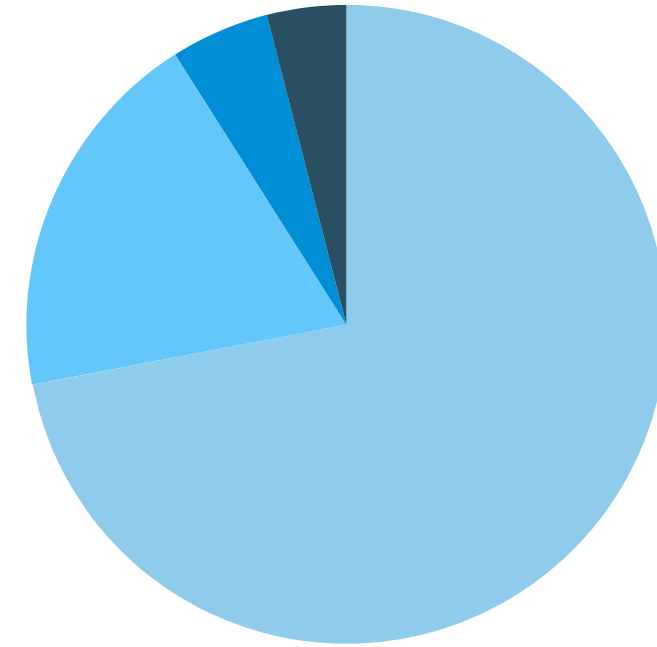
REVENUE BY CATEGORY


